A LETTER FROM SARA

Home Suite Hope works to change the trajectory of people's lives by disrupting generational poverty at its roots. We do this by offering a helping hand up to homeless single parent led families; wrapping all necessary and individualized services around each family to ensure that they obtain the tools necessary to become self-sufficient. Our programming works from a Housing First principle, that is an understanding that individuals need a safe and secure roof over their heads before they can start working through the myriad of barriers that may be preventing self-sufficiency. All participants are granted a housing subsidy, take part in a full year of life skills training and are connected to supports ranging from foodbanks, counselling and childcare to referrals to other services. Participants who have the aptitude and attitude are provided with full scholarships to complete post secondary education. They are provided with transportation and book costs as well as one-to-one mentorship by female leaders at Sheridan and throughout our community. During this time the participants take part in professional development workshops and work with our Industry Council to become job ready. Once the participants obtain employment, we begin to scale back services until they are fully self-sufficient.

It is to no surprise that dealing with the aftermath of a global pandemic has been a huge curve ball throwing new stressors at our participants and causing brutal and unrelenting inflation on basic needs and rental prices. Despite these challenges, our participants persevere and continue to show strength and resilience! Through our programs, we have been able to house 100% of participants upon entering the program from a state of homelessness or precarious housing situations. Eighty-two percent of participants secured employment after obtaining their post- secondary education. To date, the annual full-time salary earnings of participants is \$46,514. Upon exiting, 90% of participants remained housed and are able to handle market rate rent. This is what stopping generational reliance on social assistance looks like!

None of this would be possible without the community wrapping their arms around our organization. The impact of our organization is dependent upon not only our amazing community partners (Halton Region, Sheridan College, Oakville Community Foundation, Food For Life, Kerr Street Mission, etc.) but also heavily dependent upon all of our corporate and individual donors. As a not-for-profit, all of our programming is dependent on a combination of government grants, service clubs, foundations, faithbased grants, fundraising events, corporate and individual donations.

As we strategically plan and budget to allocate funds to our programs and families, we are keenly aware of the difficulties that high rates of inflation have brought our organization. We are hoping that the champions that have invested into building a better community will continue to support us as we help all our families end their cycle of poverty. We also understand that not everyone is in the position to give financially but still want to get involved in other ways. The Ways of Giving to HSH newsletter has been written to showcase all the ways that you can support the work that we do at Home Suite Hope. From weekly, to monthly or annual automated donations, to corporate sponsorships, or becoming a partner in change and sponsoring one family through their journey. Or perhaps you have experience with event planning, employment and support connections, or expertise in the field, which are needed on committees like the Industry Council or Board of Director committees, or willing to simply connect us to other resources and networks. Every connection and contribution, whether big or small, helps us reach our annual goals and continue to help single parents permanently change their lives for the better.

Ways of Giving

Individual gifts come to Home Suite Hope in a variety of ways. Here we would like to highlight some of the ways that you might consider giving:

- 1** Mail a cheque to 1-200 North Service Rd. West, #424. Oakville, ON L6M 2Y1 addressed to Izabel Rader.
- 2** Donate weekly, bi-weekly, monthly or annually by credit card on our Canada Helps platform and receive an immediate tax receipt: <https://www.canadahelps.org/en/charities/home-suite-hope-shared-living-corp/>.
- 3** Set up an **Electronic Fund Transfer** from your bank account to ours on a schedule that works for you!
- 4** Email transfer funds automatically to our bank account by emailing our Bookkeeper, Izabel Rader at izabel@homesuitehope.org. Be sure to send her an email with your information so she can issue you a tax receipt!
- 5** **Transfer of Stocks:** Home Suite Hope accepts Donation of Securities, including publicly listed shares, bonds or mutual fund units. By donating securities directly to a charity, as opposed to selling them and donating the proceeds, the capital gains tax can be eliminated. This means more money for the charity and a greater charitable tax credit for you.
- 6** **Wills & Bequests:** Your will is a powerful thing! You can change the world with a charitable gift in your Will, while still supporting those you love.

CORPORATE

Ways of Giving

MEET SANDRA

See what your giving can do

I was born and raised in The Philippines and had a very successful career. By the age of 25, I was already holding the position of Regional Manager at a construction company and doing very well. However, my job became a source of friction at home and my marriage began to get unhealthy.

I finally found the courage to leave, but it came with years of costly legal representation as I fought for my freedom and custody of my children. Finances became very tight, and it was getting difficult to manage all my expenses. My brother encouraged me to seek a new life in Canada — so I did.

Because my marriage and custody cases were not finalized, I had to leave my children in the care of my parents. As I built my life in Canada, I continued to support my children across seas by sending money back to the Philippines. I rented out a room and lived with five other people as I worked as a caregiver so I could become eligible to officially settle in Canada.

After being separated for five years, I was finally able to move my sons to be in Canada with me. I was so happy to be reunited with them, but it was very difficult. Adjusting to winter temperatures, being confined in a dark basement apartment, going to a new school, meanwhile having a parent that is trying to balance home life along with three other jobs to make ends meet was not ideal for a happy family.

I learned about Home Suite Hope while I was volunteering and it was one of the best discoveries. HSH helped me in so many ways: emotionally, professionally and financially. Before HSH, I lacked direction. I always wanted to improve and upgrade my skills and HSH helped me to achieve my goals.

I have now officially finished my diploma in Business Management in Human Resources at Sheridan College and I have secured full-time employment in my field of study. After graduating from the HSH program, I feel confident about who I am and I believe in myself. Working with Home Suite Hope is like having a big family, it has been amazing!



FOUNDATIONS

Ways of Giving

1 Community Foundations: Community Foundations help guide volunteer efforts, financial support and personal foundation efforts to where it will have the greatest impact based on geographical location, and population-specific needs.

HIGHLIGHTS

Oakville Community Foundation has been one of the most consistent supporters of Home Suite Hope's Homeward Bound Halton program directing philanthropic resources to Academic and Jill of All Trades programming. Certain OCF fundholders will directly allocate funding to HSH through their annual GIVEOakville campaign. **The Burlington Community Foundation** donated to Home Suite Hope's program to aid in resource expansion to further support HSH families residing in Burlington.

Through the Aqueduct Foundation, **Peter and Eve Willis** have donated more than \$7500 towards participant supports and the areas of greatest need.

2 Private Family Foundations: The most promising approaches to social and economic mobility create opportunities for and address the needs of the "whole family".

HIGHLIGHTS

Larry and Gerry Wilson Foundation and Leah Battista Foundation:

These two funds held within the Oakville Community Foundation, donate \$10,000 to bridge the funding gap for a family for one year. This year, the LeVan Family Foundation (a fund held within the Oakville Community Foundation) donated toward supporting four HSH families over the next year.

JP Bickell Foundation: The JP Bickell Foundation was established by Canadian businessman J.P. Bickell to support three charitable programs. In 2020, The JP Bickell Foundation's contribution of \$86,400 over 3-years provided rental subsidies for 3 young parents, providing the environment necessary to be successful. In 2024, the Foundation contributed \$46,600 for rental subsidies to support 5 HBH graduates with an extended employment support and transition period into independence and self-sufficiency.

3 Company Foundations: Company foundations and employee-advised community funds allow companies to invest money in an account dedicated solely to charitable giving, and then use that money to make a difference in the community.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Greater Toronto Apartment Association (GTAA) Charitable Foundation is an ongoing supporter of HSH programming. For the fourth year, HSH was awarded \$20,000 from the foundation.



Home Suite Hope is proud to be part of Oakville Community Foundation's GiveOakville campaign. GiveOakville is an online crowd-funding platform. 100% of donations are shared with the featured charity of your choice, PLUS your donation is eligible to be topped-up by the foundation.

Have a way to give that is different or unique?

Sometimes our local community comes to us with amazing and innovative ways to contribute to Home Suite Hope financially.

1 First Canadian Title's Academic Scholarship: With parents and their children pursuing post-secondary education, HSH is experiencing the breaking of generational poverty in the present day. Now in its seventh consecutive year, First Canadian Title's scholarship program was named after The Honourable William G. Davis, the 18th Premier of Ontario and current FCT board chairman, whose passion for education contributed to his work in building Ontario's community college system. FCT launched the scholarship in 2015, to help deserving students attend post-secondary education. Since then, the scholarship has helped 15 students across Canada offset some of the financial challenges that come with attending college or university. In 2018, FCT opened up a yearly competition for a \$5000 scholarship. To date, 4 youth at HSH have been awarded the scholarship.

2 Kits for a Cause: This past year, Home Suite Hope received a donation from CIBC Mellon through Kits for a Cause. A packing party for CIBC Mellon staff was held to pack and organize backpacks filled with essential items for participants and children.

3 The Lions Club of Oakville: The Lions Club of Oakville donates funds to unique participant needs as they arise. In past, they answered the call for laptops for our first participants that pursued a technology program and supporting a participant's campaign to raise money for an accessible van for her daughter who is quadriplegic.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING CAMPAIGN

Ways of Giving

Housing is an urgent issue. For single mothers receiving social assistance, their monthly social assistance includes only \$642 for shelter costs. Halton's housing costs are among the highest in Canada, making it nearly impossible for families to escape homelessness, even with our subsidies.

There's no one-size-fits-all solution to this affordability problem. Instead, Home Suite Hope takes a pillared approach to address housing needs:

The first pillar, HSH would pre-pay rent in existing buildings to ensure participants are housed immediately. It requires an upfront investment but ensures that our participants have affordable housing in today's challenging market, preventing hidden homelessness from becoming visible.

The second pillar, involves partnering with organizations to secure blocks of housing units in new builds. This approach creates a sense of community and improves the efficiency of service delivery.

Home Suite Hope has worked tirelessly to bring awareness and funds to this critical issue. The public discussions of our need for more access to affordable housing really began in 2023, when Callum Wallace launched Flight For Hope—a solo flight around the world in his single engine plane to bring both awareness and funds to this housing crisis. His return marked the official launch of Home Suite Hope's affordable housing campaign, at the HSH's Home for Good Gala.

HSH is in desperate need for affordable housing options and cannot sit idly and wait. Too much is at stake; too many futures hang in the balance.

THE IMPORTANCE OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Affordable housing holds significant importance for single parent families like ours. It's more than just a place to live; it's a foundation for stability. Having access to safe, affordable housing means we can focus on other aspects of our lives, such as education, career growth, and personal development, without the constant financial stress of housing costs.

An affordable housing unit would open up avenues for us to create a more stable future. It would provide a secure home base from which I could pursue my career, further my education, and save for our future. This stability would allow me to allocate resources toward my son's education, extracurricular activities, and experiences that contribute to his holistic development.

Unfortunately, finding affordable housing as a single parent can be incredibly challenging. Many factors contribute to this difficulty, including limited availability of affordable units, high demand, and the financial strain of being a sole provider. In addition to rent, there are numerous other significant expenses that single parents have to cover alone, such as childcare, healthcare, education, and daily living costs. This financial strain can make it hard to make ends meet, leading to a cycle of financial stress.

Access to safe, affordable housing indeed enables us to focus on other areas of development. When we have a stable place to call home, it relieves the burden of constantly worrying about our living situation. This stability allows us to allocate our energy towards personal growth, building skills, pursuing education, and seeking career opportunities that can break the cycle of poverty.

The community support of the Affordable Housing Campaign is invaluable. It signifies that our society acknowledges the challenges single parents face and is willing to provide a helping hand. The campaign's efforts can lead to real change in our lives by not only offering affordable housing options but also fostering a sense of community and empowerment. Knowing that we have support from the community enables us to build legacies of empowered prosperity for ourselves and our children. It paves the way for us to break down barriers, achieve our dreams, and show the world that single parents are capable of remarkable achievements when given the opportunity and support they deserve.

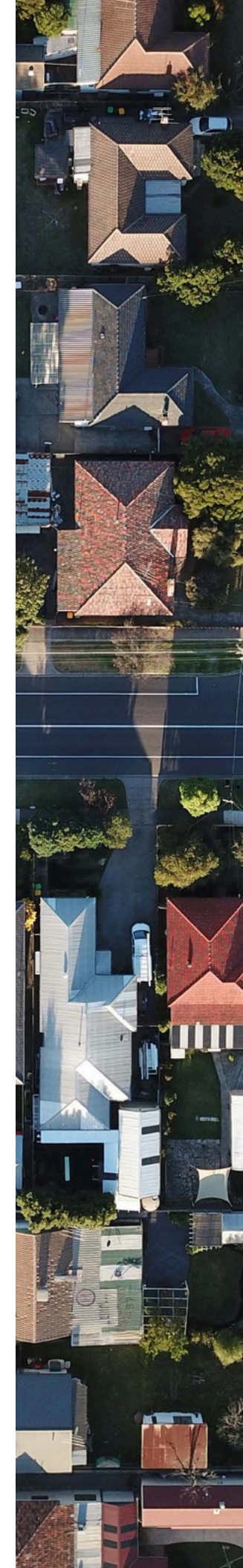

PARTNERS IN CHANGE

Through the Partners in Change campaign, HSH hopes to find those willing to sponsor our families and close the funding gaps in HSH Programming and Housing. Sponsors are given the opportunity to know the family, through community events, including the participant's HSH graduation. Sponsorships can be done on an annual basis, team basis or for the four-year duration.

This campaign seeks partners to address the annual **\$9,595 program funding gap** and the **\$14,400 housing funding gap**, for each family to help them journey from homelessness or precarious housing to a stable home, education and a brighter future - hope.

HIGHLIGHTS

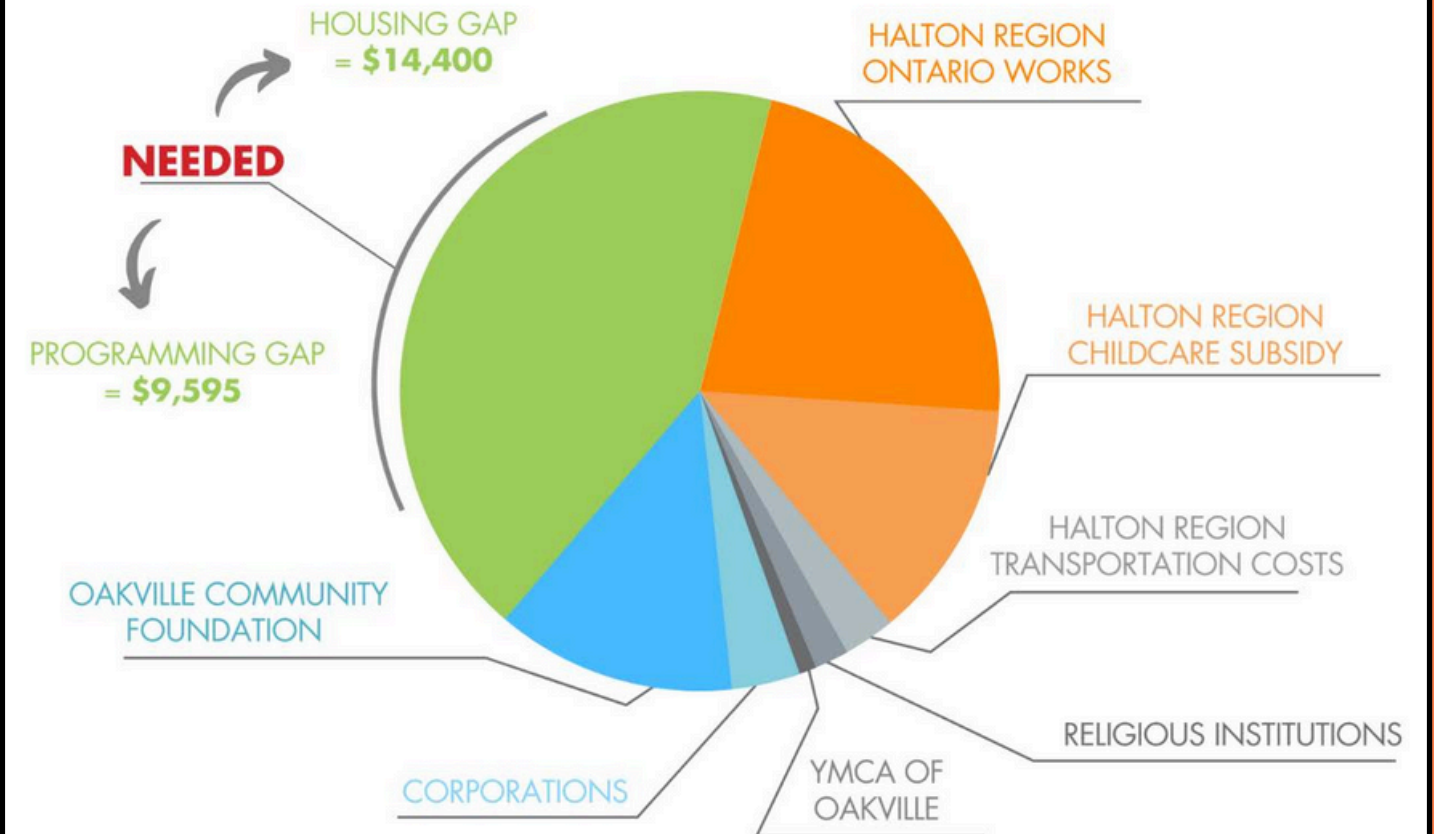
St. Jude's Anglican Church – As HSH's first Partner in Change, St. Jude's stepped up to sponsor a mother and her son to bridge the funding gap for three years of her programming. The church is now supporting their second family, sponsoring a mother and her daughter in the HBH program.

Mark McLaughlin committed to an annual Partner in Change Investment in a family for 4-Years. When asked about why he wants to invest, "I was looking for a place to invest, not donate. My financial background makes me use that terminology. The concept of investing in an individual with a family and the group of experienced HSH staff and their success rate sounded like a pretty good return to me."

In November 2022, **100 Women Who Care Burlington** have chosen to sponsor HSH for the funding gap of the full 2022-23 School Year for one Homeward Bound Halton Youth.

In 2022, HSH successfully matched **9 families** with a Partner in Change to bridge the funding gap for their school year.

MEET CAROLINA

Carolina's life changed when she discovered pornographic videos of her 13-year-old daughter made by her child's father. It was in that moment Carolina knew her and her children's lives would change forever.

Her days became filled with police involvement, Children's Aid Services, and family and criminal court. The accumulation of personal and family trauma continued to build and Carolina found herself homeless with her three children. In an instant, all of her life goals and aspirations were taken from her.

Carolina knew that in order to move forward in life, she needed to complete her education and secure a full-time job. But on her own, this goal was out of her grasp – until she found HSH. Carolina was accepted into the Homeward Bound Halton program, and it was at this point that her life changed again. However this time, it was changed permanently for the better.

After successfully graduating from the Homeward Bound Halton program, Carolina is now working full-time as a Software Engineer and Security and Privacy Champion. She earns well over the Canadian income median and has created a stable life of self-sufficiency.

"To me, the organizations and individuals that support Home Suite Hope were the lifeline that supported me when I was crushed. With their help and support, knowing that they were my silent partners, gave me the strength and will to keep pushing forward when things got too tough, when I felt like cracking and when I was too tired and exhausted to get up, because I knew I had their support, they believed in the program and therefore in me. I didn't want to disappoint them, and I wanted them to feel proud of me. They became my family here in Canada. Even when I was lonely I knew I wasn't alone."

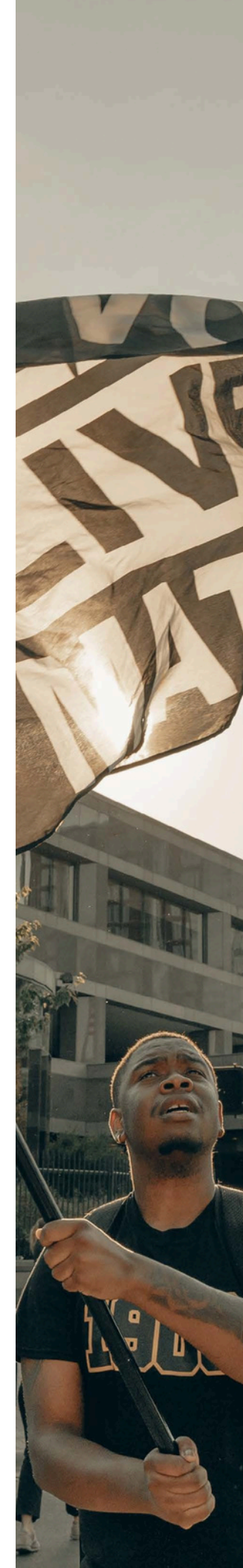

ANNUAL EVENTS

Ways of Giving

1 GivingTuesday: GivingTuesday is a global movement for giving and volunteering, taking place each year after Black Friday. The “Opening day of the giving season,” it’s a time when charities, companies and individuals join together and rally for favourite causes. In the same way that retailers take part in Black Friday, the giving community comes together for GivingTuesday.

Every year, Home Suite Hope raises gift cards for families for the holidays, and compiles a “stock” of gift cards to help our families with emergency expenses throughout the year. If a family’s car breaks down and they must pay to get it repaired, or if we must overcome a global pandemic, gift cards are given to families to help offload the financial stress.

2 Hope 4 Holidays: Help put presents in participant’s homes during the holiday season by sponsoring a family and donating items on their wish list. Sponsors will receive a “Dear HSH Donor” letter. Host an event or establish a time of giving amongst your family, friends, and coworkers to collect grocery, household, or visa gift cards to donate to our families to purchase their presents and holiday needs.

3 Household Item Drives: Everyday household items, such as cleaning supplies, toiletries, personal hygiene products and cabinet staples can take up a considerable amount of money in a participant’s monthly budget. These drop offs can be arranged with Angela Blackburn, angelab@homesuitehope.org.

4 Grocery Gift Card Donations: Sometimes life throws a curve ball and unexpected expenses arise. This could look like medical and dental costs, kids outgrowing clothing rapidly, car repairs, broken or stolen items, or household repairs. Home Suite Hope tries to help our participants recover from these unplanned expenses by providing grocery cards to help offset the costs and reduce their expenses for the month.

5 Running on Empty: The rising cost of transportation has created increasing difficulties for our parents to accomplish their daily tasks – groceries, case management meetings, and drop-off to childcare – which is why HSH will be accepting donations toward gas gift cards, to purchase special requests for their vehicles and other potential transportation-related set-backs.

6 Empty Bowls: Our annual Empty Bowls fundraiser brings together local soup vendors with our wonderful community members, donors, and corporate sponsors to raise money for Home Suite Hope programming. As a community favourite event, Empty Bowls truly brings together the Halton Community for a good cause. 7 Bi-Annual Home for Good Gala: A gala first held to celebrate the launch of Home Suite Hope’s affordable housing campaign and the return of Flight for Hope’s Around the World flight, the gala will continue on to ignite the beacon of hope for those caught in the storm of homelessness to raise funds and awareness for affordable housing. All proceeds will be used to create affordable housing units for HSH single parent families. 1 Industry Council: The Industry Council plays a critical role in the development and success of the Homeward Bound Halton program. The Industry Council is a group of senior executives from a variety of fields with decision-making authority who meet throughout the Homeward Bound Halton program to support the professional advancement of participants in the program. The Industry Council is a group made up of 8-12 representatives from organizations including private sector businesses, non-profit and public sector employers, community champions with influence in the local community and representatives from employment services at the local college, municipality or community services organization. A key success factor for Homeward Bound Halton participants is that the college programs available through the program are aligned to the local labour market opportunities with the organizations that sit on the Industry Council.
